

### Who? What?

- Who we plan to serve: Brothers United serves low income adult fathers and young fathers age 16-24. We have a specific focus on at-risk youth ages 16-24 who are:
  - × Not in school
  - ▼ Not working
  - ➤ Have a history with the criminal justice system
  - ➤ Have a mental or health condition
  - Heavy concentration on African Americans







### Where?

Brothers United will work within the corporate limits of Toledo, Ohio where the most densely populated, and poorest neighborhoods in the city. We will target service areas where there are high crime rates, poor educational outcomes, high joblessness and the areas where the highest teen birth rates and the greatest gang activity.



### Why?

- Toledo's population is 287,208 (small city with big city issues)
- Toledo's poverty rate is 27.2%.
- 33,000 children live at or below the poverty rate
- Toledo has the 53<sup>rd</sup> highest poverty rate, more then 600 major cities in the United States
- Lucas county is ranked number 5 statewide for teen pregnancy rates
- Toledo is the 5<sup>th</sup> poorest performing district for drop outs- 7.8%
- The unemployment rate is 6.5%



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# AT RISK YOUTH



## DEFINITION OF "AT RISK YOUTH"

- Less likely to successfully transition into adulthood
- High ACE scores
- Lives in adverse environment
- Suffers from emotional, mental or physical challenges
- Flirting with dangerous behavior (drugs, risky sexual decisions, gangs, etc.)
- · Requires temporary or ongoing intervention in order to succeed

# HIGH RISK YOUTH



## HIGH RISK YOUTH

- High ACE scores
- Previously or currently incarcerated
- Actively participating in high risk behavior (substance abuse, gang membership, sexual promiscuity, self harm or other addictions)
- Mentally, emotionally, physically challenged
- Little to no adult support/trusted adult connection
- Needs heavy intervention to successfully transfer into adulthood

## METHOD 1: SELF ANALYSIS

If your audience believes you are not relevant or credible then you will not be effective that day.

### SELF ANALYSIS

- Get a mentor, teacher or life coach who is not afraid to tell you the truth. We would rather be killed by praise than saved by criticism.
- Peer evaluations on all presentations
- Implement and study your class evaluations and evolve.
- Don't try to be something you are not.
- Youth will respect "real." It doesn't have to look or sound like them, but it has to be authentic.
- Be creative or lose engagement. The days of PP are over!

## METHOD 2: RELATIONSHIP

Connection over Correction

## RELATIONSHIP

- Establish rapport by finding a healthy balance of self disclosure, vulnerability and authority.
- Connection over correction
- Are you in it for the income or the outcome? They will know!
- Focus on them, not on you. People feel valued when they are heard not when they're only hearing you.

# METHOD 3: IMPLEMENTATION

Think outside the box.....in fact, there is no box!

## IMPLEMENTATION


- Don't dumb it down.
- · Don't lie.
- Include them into your presentation.
- Bring others to help you if possible.
- · Make it fun.
- Dare to try new methods that will make them think. Push the envelope but don't get fired please!
